There are so many direct and indirect allusions to Dante's masterpiece that reading it in its entirety is a must for AP students.

We have placed a copy of the Dante brochure on the school summer reading website, which will give you more information before you read, but **your annotation should include**: epic similes, mythological references, the change in the relationship between Dante and Virgil, and a clear understanding of how the punishment reflects the sin.
2. **Complete** the data sheet specific to *Dante's Inferno* found on the Dacula High School web site/summer reading, which will be due the first day of school.

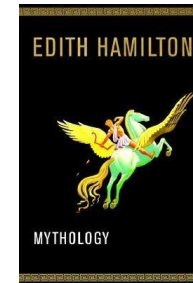
1984
